Parking Restrictions & Crossing improvements



December 2018

St Bede's Catholic College as part of its school expansion planning application has funding for waiting restrictions (double yellow lines etc) at junctions, resident driveways and school access points to prevent obstructive parking. There is also funding available to provide informal crossing places for pedestrians and we are therefore seeking residents and other highway users views on this proposed design.



These improvements will involve the installation of dropped kerbs, tactile paving (for visually impaired pedestrians) and new bollards. Existing kerblines will not change.

It is proposed to provide informal crossing points at:

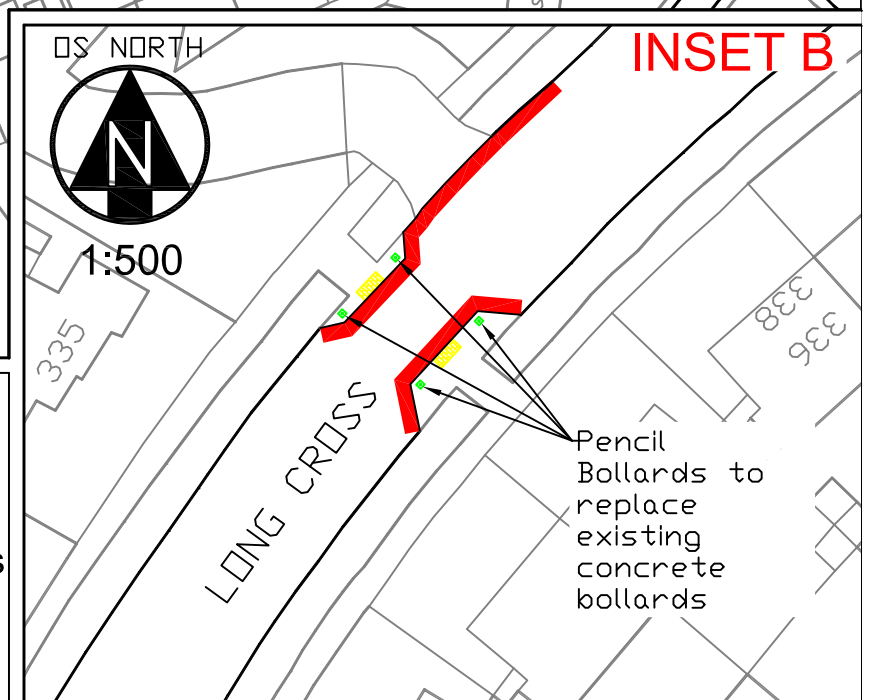
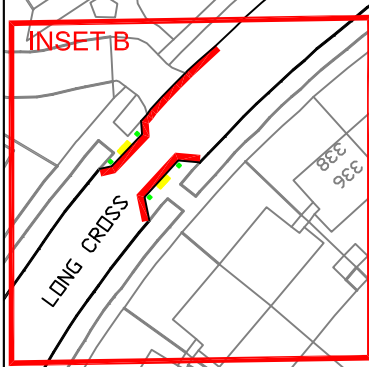
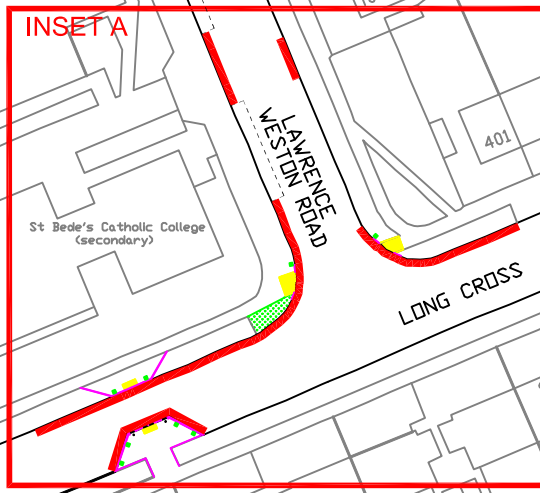
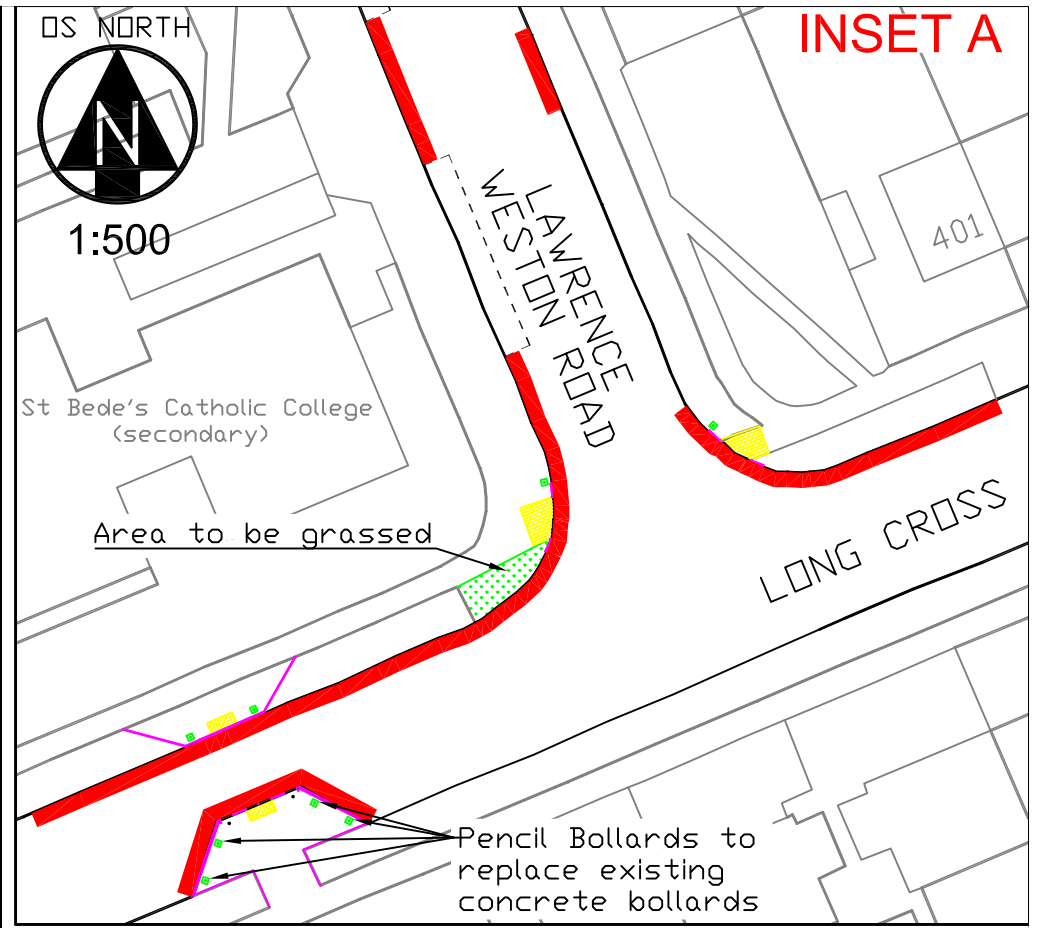
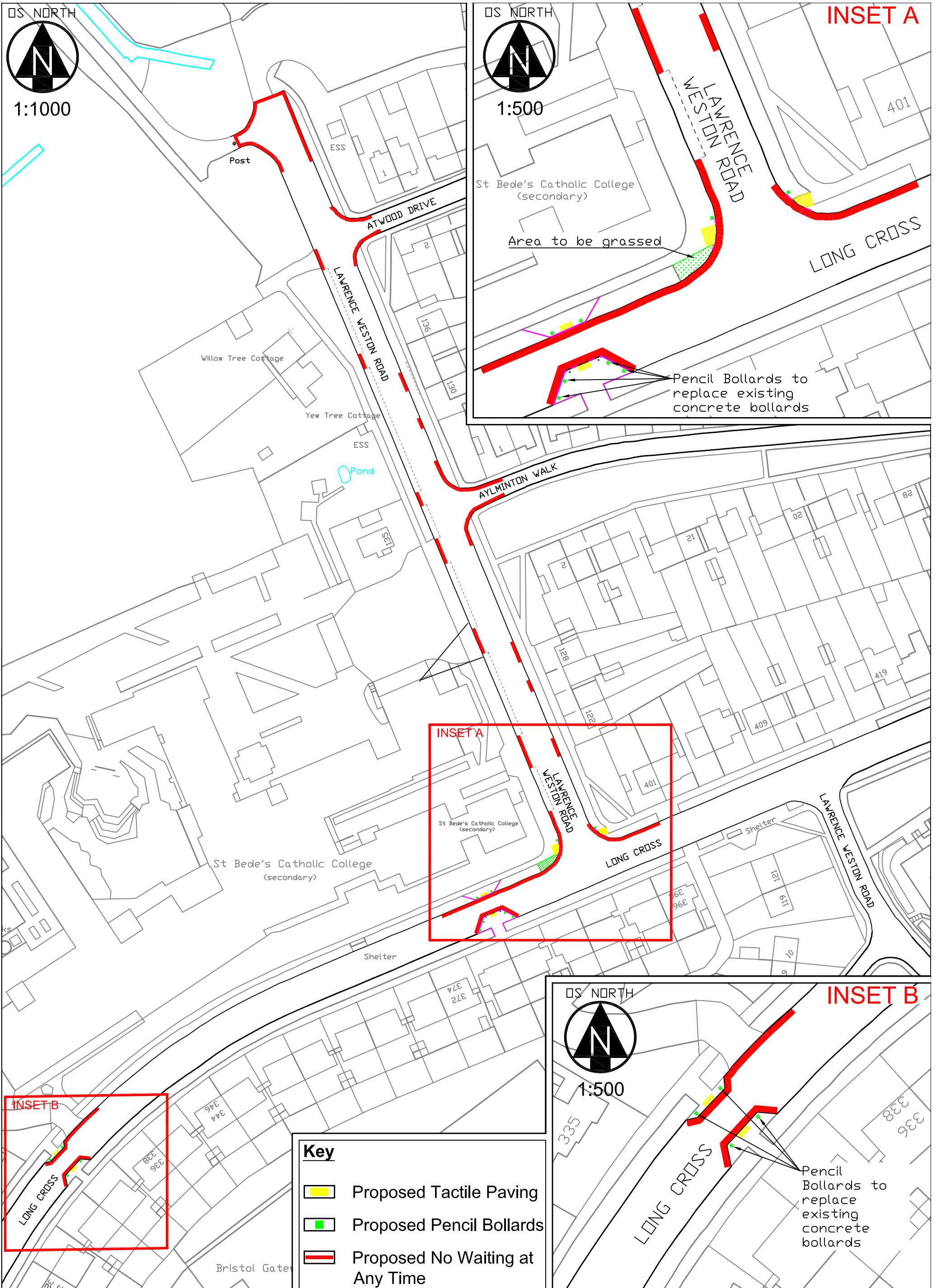
- Junction of Lawrence Weston Road/Long Cross
- Existing priority narrowing on Long Cross (west of Lawrence Weston Road)



It is not possible to provide a formal crossing on Long Cross near to the school due to the location of disabled parking bays and the location of trees obstructing visibility.

Please note it is currently not proposed to change the advisory parking bays into mandatory coach parking bays with these proposals, so as to enable parents to continue to drop off their children using the bays.

If you have any suggestions then please contact Highways Service by **4th January 2019** using the contact details below.

Any issues that are raised will be considered, and, if acceptable, will be included in the proposed scheme. **It is important to take action now if you would like double yellow lines across you driveway for instance in addition to the ones on the plan overleaf. Please put this in writing with your address and request details.**

Once comments have been received the next stage of the process is to go through Statutory Consultation for the Traffic Regulation Order required for waiting restrictions. This is a sometimes lengthy legal process which will involve placing a Notice of Intent in the local press and posting Notices on site to advertise the proposals. Depending on the nature and level of objections and support for the scheme, the Director: Management of Place, Bristol City Council will decide if it is appropriate to pursue the scheme.
